Passage: Psalm 4

Introduction

- This Psalm is written by King David of Israel during this flight from Jerusalem following Absalom's takeover. Absalom, David's son, betrayed his father and sought to take his throne and dignity. This Psalm is written as a response to these events, which are some of the most tragic and darkest days that King David ever faced.
- Two attributes of God stand out in the Psalm: God's sovereignty and God's grace. These attributes are weaved throughout the message of David's psalm which would be sung and proclaimed for generations to come.

	i. "O men" can be translated as "men of earth" or "exalted ones." These men, though exalted in earthly power, are nothing compared to the sovereign God. Their weakness is their own spiritual depravity. They are not just David's enemies; they are the enemies of God.

	i. "How long shall my honor be turned to shame (insulted)?" is a rhetorica device. His question infers that the enemy will not be able to persecute God's servant forever.
	C. David expresses his over the enemy's $\sin - vs$. $2c$
	i. David is agonizing because of his for the enemy.
	ii. David is hurting because his enemy is by sin.
